Science of Harvest: Community and Classroom Innovation



Longfellow Science Teacher Elizabeth Ramsey Received Grant with Student

When Longfellow Middle School science teacher Elizabeth Ramsey met Sister Lucy Slinger, professor and sustainability coordinator at Viterbo University, an innovative community service and science

collaboration was born. Using funds from a Classroom Innovation Grant, Ramsey started a plant growth laboratory in her classroom last spring. Students tested and measured organic fertilizers and

learned valuable lessons in sustainable food growth.

Students transplanted their “baby plants”—as they affectionately called them—to the St. Joseph Villa Gardens, where Sister Lucy and others nurtured them during the summer before being harvested last month.

“I incorporate World Food Day into our service project,” said Ramsey. “We start with our own perceptions of hunger and then compare to published statistics. My students are able to make many sophisticated conclusions and use a problem solving process to identify a goal, actions, and outcomes. Never underestimate the mind of a 13-year-old!”

Logan High School English teacher Andrea Kramer and Central High School World Language Teacher John Havlicek each received \$250 classroom grants from the Foundation during the Board of Education’s Academic Achievement Ceremony held at Viterbo University

La Crosse Community Foundation Supports Compassion Project

The La Crosse Community Foundation awarded the La Crosse Public Education Foundation a \$5,000 grant in support of the La Crosse Compassion Project.

The project involves nearly 6,000 La Crosse School District K-12 art students. Throughout the academic year, participating students will receive a 6-inch-by-six-inch art canvas and be asked to draw or paint

their idea of compassion. Additionally, students will be asked to write a brief statement about their work. The project aspires to teach the practice of compassion through the use of art and writing.

The inspiration behind the project came from Richard Davidson, PhD – a University of Wisconsin-Madison psychology and psychiatry professor and brain researcher whose research

has shown that those who practice compassion have measurably healthier brains, and generally, a happier outlook on life.

Collectively, the 6,000 artworks will be installed in The Pump House Regional Arts Center galleries, where they will be on view to public, from May 2 – June 28, 2014.

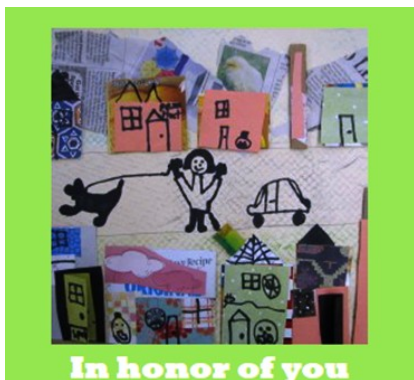
When the Foundation receives a gift in honor of someone, the donor is

In 2007, Maureen and Robert Freedland established an endowed fund in memory of their families and all others who perished in the Holocaust. The fund was established for the benefit of La Crosse Public School District students to advance their understanding of the “Shoah,” the systematic genocide

against the Jewish people and other so-called undesirable groups targeted for destruction by the Nazi regime in World War II. Grants are awarded for educational projects with priority given to activities concentrating on the Shoah, but related topics may be considered as long as a connection to the Shoah is maintained.

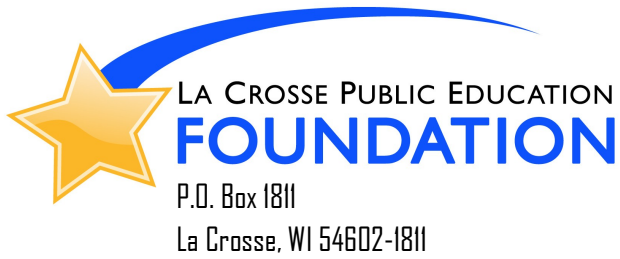
