

Latest grants help teachers' dreams come true

Support for virtual reality software and hardware, school gardens, weight room improvements, a community visit by an award-winning author, ice fishing equipment and a special jazz arrangement for a middle school ensemble were among 15 grants totaling almost \$29,000 announced April 10 by the La Crosse Public Education Foundation (LPEF).

Several of the latest Gold Star Grant projects focus on equity and social justice efforts, including purchase of teaching resources and books for reading clubs, and support for an effort to increase the number of teachers of color in the School District of La Crosse.

The 15 grants were chosen from among 28 applications requesting more than \$100,000. Grants are selected for funding based on creativity, ability to engage students and the total impact or reach of the project. This is the second round of LPEF grants awarded this school year, bringing the total to \$70,353 awarded to 47 grant recipients.

New endowed fund supports arts/humanities grants

Former LPEF Board President Rachel Gundersen, a retired school psychologist, has created a new endowment fund to enhance learning opportunities for students in the arts and/or the humanities. The fund, established through a generous gift to the La Crosse Public Education Foundation, will provide an annual grant in perpetuity related to fine arts,

history, literature, global studies or a host of other topics. Teachers will apply through the usual twice-annual LPEF grants process, with the first grant expected to be available in 2019.

Gundersen said she wanted to provide school staff with an incentive to implement innovative programs. “I’m just astounded at the creativity of the people who work in this District,” Gundersen said, adding that “a little bit of money goes a long way for an individual teacher.”

2nd round brings total grants to \$70,353

Here is a brief summary of 15 grants totaling \$29,000 awarded April 10 by LPEF. For the school year, LPEF has supported 47 projects at a cost of \$70,353:

Multiple schools

- \$4,000 to bring award-winning author Gene Luen Yang for a 2-day visit to La Crosse in Spring 2019.
- \$4,000 for teaching resources and books to inspire all students and help them find their voices, including creating social justice book clubs across the district.
- \$2,400 for tuition assistance for two district employees working on teaching degrees by attending UW-L's Grow Our Own Teacher Diversity program.
- \$1,900 for toolbox kits of books and curriculum materials to improve student social and emotional learning.

School gardens

- \$2,338 to GROW La Crosse to support new garden projects at Hintgen and Hamilton/SOTA I.

Hintgen Elementary

- \$2,345 for a "kindness retreat" to help 4th-5th graders improve school culture.
- \$632 for computer hardware to use DVDs that help calm students at the start of the day or following recess.

North Woods International School

- \$2,500 for initial purchase of multicultural books as North Woods begins to implement the International Baccalaureate Primary Years Program.

Southern Bluffs Elementary

- \$774 for two sets of books on equity and social justice issues for group reading and studies by staff.

Summit Environmental School

- \$1,543 to buy ice-fishing equipment for student use three days each winter in physical education classes.

Logan Middle School

- \$361 for story cards and wordless books to improve writing skills among students with intellectual disabilities.

Longfellow Middle School and La Crosse Design Institute

- \$3,050 for hardware/software for students to use virtual reality and 3-D modeling for classroom projects.
- \$1,000 to commission an arrangement of "Fanfare for the Common Man," by Aaron Copland, for performances by the Longfellow/LDI jazz ensemble.

Logan High School

- \$1,700 to purchase new upholstery for benches in the weight room and other upgraded equipment for use by physical education classes and athletes.
- \$435 to invite Jamie Nabozny to speak and screen his documentary, "Bullied," about struggling in school as he was bullied for being gay.

Bowtie golf outing set for Sept. 1

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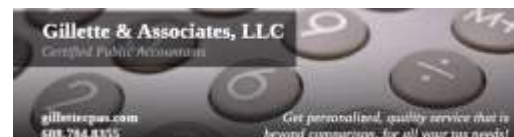
